Objective: to assist the governments of the participating countries in meeting the

"Coastal Fisheries Initiative" (CFI)

Source of funding: 34.1 million from the GEF and \$201.5 m in CF

Indonesia child project \$10,642,202 from GEF and \$52.1m CF

IA: Partnership of six organizations (CI, FAO, UNDP, UN Environment, World

Bank, WWF)

Objective: working in different geographies to address key elements of issues

facing coastal fisheries by adopting an integrated approach towards the

fisheries sector, inclusive of biodiversity conservation, the economic

potential of the sector, and respect for human rights and the need for

livelihood security; and effective governance arrangements.

In Asia = East Indonesia (with WWF and CI)







"Coastal Fisheries Initiative" (CFI)

2 cross cutting mechanisms i.e. the Challenge Fund and the Global Partnership to improve environmental and economic benefits through the application of improved coastal fisheries management including Ecosystem Approach to Fisheries Management (EAFM) principles, fisheries improvement projects (FIPs) and improved knowledge management and information dissemination in the waters of eastern Indonesia.

Birds Head Seascape (BHS) trust fund to support long-term sustainable financing for marine conservation initiatives

Duration: 5 years







'Partnerships for the Environmental Management of the Seas of East Asia' Initiative (PEMSEA)

IA: UNDP

EA: PEMSEA and countries

PEMSEA consists of three phases.

- "Prevention and Management of Marine Pollution in the East Asian Seas" [GEF: US\$8.0 million GEF - CF: \$11.42 m - July 1993-July 2000]
- Resulted in the set-up of <u>ICM pilot sites</u> in Xiamen (PR China) and Batangas Bay (Philippines); mobilization of sub regional efforts (Indonesia, Malaysia and Singapore) to address <u>marine pollution</u> problems in the Straits of Malacca and Straits of Singapore; and <u>strengthened capacity development</u> in Cambodia, PR China, DPR Korea, Indonesia, Philippines, Thailand and Viet Nam.







'Partnerships for the Environmental Management of the Seas of East Asia' Initiative (PEMSEA)

- "Building Partnerships for the Environmental Protection and Management of the East Asian Seas" [GEF: \$16.22 m CF 12,321,000 1999-2007]
- Focused on building <u>intergovernmental</u>, <u>interagency and multi-sectoral</u> <u>partnerships</u> in environmental management. This was followed by the development of a <u>Sustainable Development Strategy for the Seas of East Asia</u>
 - "Implementation of Sustainable Development Strategy for the Seas of East Asia (SDS-SEA)" [GEF: 10,876,336 m - CF: \$33,374,400 - 2007-2010 + GEF: 11,500,000 - CF: 25,110,000 (RBM) 2016-2020]
- Will result in the provision of integrated solutions for effective management of coastal and marine areas, supporting sustainable economic growth and blue economy, ecosystem rehabilitation and protection and adaptive and resilient communities + RBM in Cambodia; Indonesia; Lao PDR; Malaysia; Myanmar; Philippines; Vietnam.







'Global Sustainable Supply Chains for Marine Commodities'

Source of funding: \$5,500,000 from the GEF and \$34,590,000 in CF

IA: UNDP

EA: National Government Agencies in four countries (Indonesia, Philippines,

Costa Rice and Ecuador); Sustainable Fisheries Partnership Foundation

Objective:

to mainstream sustainability into seafood supply chains through market and policy mechanisms and partnerships with the overarching goal of rebuilding and protecting fish stocks and livelihoods. The project will improve emerging tools such as corporate sustainable purchase policies, sustainable marine commodities platforms, and fisheries improvement projects (FIP), developing national capacities, and generating learning to be shared worldwide.

Duration: Endorsed in January 2016 for 4 years.
